
Yellowstone. Banff. Acadia. Arches.

U.S. National Parks

THE EAST

Acadia National Park, Maine Acadia wears its superlatives like the proud Down Easter' Yankee she is: Cadillac Mountain, the high point in the park, is the first place in the United States the sun kisses daily. It is the first national park east of the Mississippi. It's the only one "built" by the efforts and donated funds of the public – the residents of nearby Bar Harbor. And Somes Sound, a long-fingered waterway, is the only fjord found on the East Coast.

Mount Desert Isle, home to most of Acadia, is a moody, glacier-constructed landscape covered in birches and spruce trees and bordered by dramatic headlands, pink granite cliffs and secret coves. John D. Rockefeller had carriage roads, linked by picture-perfect stone bridges, built throughout the park.

THE SOUTHWEST

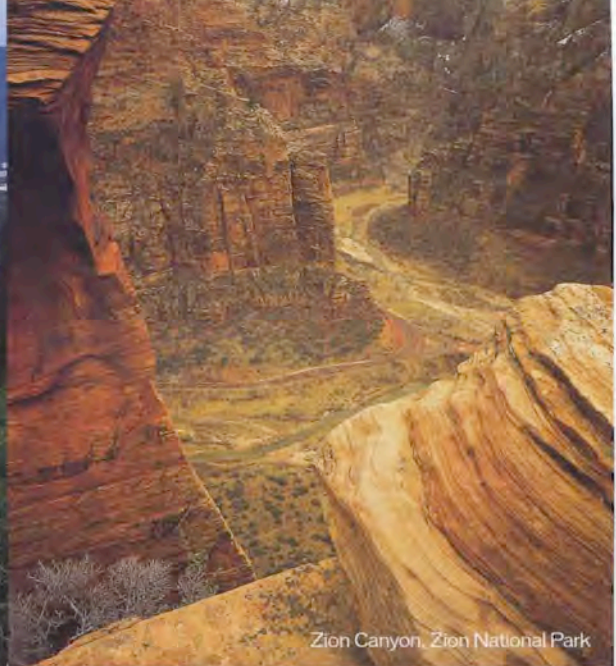
Grand Canyon National Park, Arizona Not only is the Grand Canyon, as Teddy Roosevelt proclaimed, "the one great sight every American should see," but it may well be the single most awe-inspiring view in the world.

The statistics themselves seem unreal: the canyon walls reach 5,800 feet down to the river that carved it. The layers of rock reach back two billion years. And the rocks lining the bottom of the Inner Gorge are perhaps the oldest exposed rocks on the earth. Stand at one of the Canyon viewpoints at sunrise or sunset and watch the choreographed play of light and shadow upon the theaters of stone.

Glacier National Park, Montana It straddles the Continental Divide and shares the Canadian border with its sister, Waterton Lakes National Park. It sports 50 remaining glaciers and is traversed by one of the most beautiful drives in the world, the Going to the Sun Road. Composed of verdant slopes and valleys, serene lakes and flowering meadows, Montana's masterpiece is also home to more than 1,200 plant species and 65 native mammals, among them the 200 or so grizzly bears that comprise the greatest concentration in the U.S.

Arches National Park, Utah Rock and more rock in every size, shape, act of balance and hue of red characterize Utah's 300 million-year-old terrain. So do the words otherworldly, bizarre, incomprehensible and utterly magical.





The greatest concentration of stone arches on the planet – more than 200 (and nearly 2,000 stone openings) – lend Arches National Park its name. The eroding forces of water and wind act as sculptors here, and visitors can witness their handwork in a wide variety of stages. The park's most famous namesake, Delicate Arch, soars higher than a seven-story building. Cowboys of earlier days called it "Schoolmarm's Bloomers."

Bryce National Park, Utah Sixty million years of freeze-and-thaw erosion created today's fantasy in stone. Pink, white, gold and iron-red blend together in thousands of vertical spires, minarets, towers, knobs and spikes that baffle the imagination. The Paiute Indians named this spectacle "red rocks standing like men in a bow-shaped canyon." And an early settler, Ebenezer Bryce (after whom the Canyon was named), proclaimed the area to be "a helluva place to lose a cow!"

Canyonlands National Park, Utah A park of many faces, Canyonlands can point to the Colorado and Green Rivers for building its sandstone shapes, deep gorges, and vast horizon-to-horizon spreads of flat, red rock. Not to be outdone by Utah's other erosional masterpieces, the region known as Needles boasts thousands of red and white striped spires and balanced rocks. Explorer John Wesley Powell documented this wild terrain and author Zane Grey made it the background for many of his stories.

Zion National Park, Utah "The land of the rainbow canyons" is a kaleidoscopic feast and the photographer's paradise. The demure-seeming Virgin River spent 13 million years cutting 3,000 feet of rock into chasms and narrow canyons, whose walls rise toward the heavens in shades of red, purple, pink, orange and yellow. Dramatic waterfalls, the Great Arch, Checkerboard Mesa and cliff-hanging gardens of columbine and shooting-star flowers all add to the stunning beauty of Zion.

Grand Teton National Park, Wyoming The youngest mountains in the Rockies, the Tetons create quite the vista in a 40-mile-long chain of serrated snow-capped peaks, topping off at 13,770 feet. The town of Jackson Hole, with its own breed of high-flying western style, enjoys one of the most gorgeous settings in America, while the Snake River reflects the surrounding mountain majesty. Moose, elk, pronghorn and bison call the area home and 17 species of fish lure anglers from around the country.

Steamboatin' Through the Heartland

The Delta Queen Steamboat Company gives a uniquely American experience along the rivers immortalized by Mark Twain. Stylized period elegance aboard the paddle-wheel steamers recalls the steamboatin' days of the 1800s and a wide range of eight-day itineraries immerse you in the culture, character and hospitality of our country's heartland.

Along with the timeless scenery and the impeccable antebellum architecture, history buffs will love the Lower Mississippi River cruise from New Orleans to Memphis. A visit to Vicksburg's National Military Park, which commemorates a critical point in the War between the States, offers a moving look at one of America's best preserved Civil War battlefields. Cruise prices start at \$1,070.

AMERICAN WEST AND
THE NORTHWEST

Tauck's extraordinary eight-day journey, *Canyonlands*, highlights a fantasy world of stone and scale that only the landscapes of the American West can achieve. The accommodations near or "on location" mean you'll have time to truly savor the atmosphere. 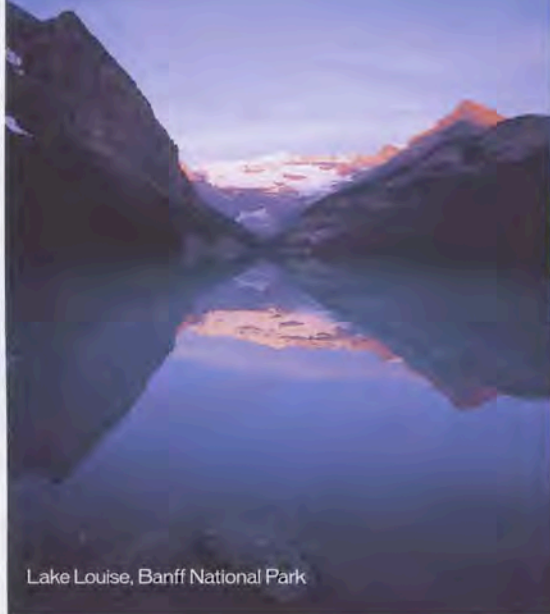

Canadian National Parks

ALBERTA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA

Banff National Park The first of Canada's parks (established in 1885) and part of the great Rocky Mountains, Banff is a symphony of vertical limestone peaks born of glaciers and geologic upheaval. Color-defying waters such as Moraine Lake and Lake Louise bewitch the eye, as do high Alpine meadows smothered in late-summer flowers.

Venerable glaciers hug vertical precipices, taunting gravity. And abundant wildlife is easy to spy: elk, caribou, deer, mountain goats, big horn sheep, marmots, grizzly and black bear, moose and dozens more.

Jasper National Park The 142-mile Icefields Parkway connecting Banff to Jasper is heralded as one of the world's most spectacular. The Columbia Icefields Visitor Center faces the Athabasca Glacier; take a Sno-Coach out on to the Icefields and walk on ice compacted by the centuries.

Jasper's wilderness is heavy on the wild. Because of its isolation, the parklands are home to the largest population of mammals in the Rockies. Both Sunwapta and the Athabasca Falls are inspiring sights, and Maligne Lake – the largest glacial body of water in the Rockies – offers up its 17-mile blue surface to the surrounding guardianship of sky-piercing peaks.

Enveloping a vast portion of the Canadian Rockies, Banff and Jasper join Yoho and Kootenay National Parks as a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site.

EASTERN CANADA

New Brunswick Two small, but stunning national parks bless New Brunswick. Within Kouchibouguac's (koosh-e-boo-gwack) 92 square miles are barrier islands that serve as home to a variety of seabirds and gray seals, wetlands and forest where moose, beavers, bear and deer reside.

Fundy National Park, established in 1948, is most famous for its bay, which embraces the world's largest tides – rising and falling as much as 55 feet every 12 hours and moving 100 billion tons of water. Some 350 species of birds live or migrate through here and one-third of the world's entire population of Right Whales (the most endangered species on the planet) call Fundy's waters home.

Nova Scotia Nova Scotia's one national park, Kejimikujik, boasts some of the most scenic canoeing in eastern Canada, 300 year-old hemlocks, and three species of turtle. But far more visitors, who come to the island for just a day or two, head for the two National Historic Sites.

Since its founding in 1749, the Halifax Defense Complex, run by Parks Canada, has been one of the British Empire's four principal naval stations. And the Marconi National Historic Site honors the inventor's role in pioneering global communications. At the Wireless Hall of Fame, you can witness the place where the first official wireless message was sent across the Atlantic to England. 🌿
